If anything has been revealed over the couple last years, it is that cycles of death and new life are always present. God is always making something new, in us and around us. ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: LAURA MCDOWELL

She participated in the first Ob/Gyn Rural Residency program in the nation and is now living her dream of working in a rural community providing Ob/Gyn care to this community and its surrounding area.

She also loves visiting National Parks and is looking forward to traveling to Acadia NP this fall with her parents as a part of a road camping trip. We asked Laura to share how her life was shaped by her time at LCM. Here is what she wrote.

LCM allowed me opportunities to engage more fully and think more critically about my relationship with God and others in this world. Having deeper conversations and going beyond the surface level was integral to the community and was something I was craving in college that no other class or friend groups were providing. Practicing having these kinds of conversations and wrestling with different challenges presented from people alike and different from me were helpful in shaping me into who I've become today. One of the best examples that demonstrates this drive to understand others and engage in these kinds of conversations was when LCM took a spring break trip to New York City with the Muslim Students Association on campus. We visited Ground Zero and discussed the differences between radical religious practices and where our respective faiths were on the spectrum. We were welcomed to a mosque to experience worship in a more physical way with prayer practices. We had real conversations about what we were all curious about and it allowed me to gain a very different perspective than what I had prior to the trip.

I am so grateful for my time with LCM. I have chosen to support this organization because I have the personal experience of how beneficial LCM was to me when attending the U and even afterwards. The community that LCM creates is long lasting and far reaching. LCM provided a space for me to expand my sense of self socially and ethically, not just my academic prowess. I feel like my participation in LCM made me a more well-rounded person and helped me to see beyond myself. These are skills that are becoming more important as our world becomes more connected and we encounter more people who are different from ourselves.

With the stress of on-campus life that students often experience – never-ending study sessions, tests, and deadlines – it can be helpful to get off campus, to be reminded of your belovedness and the rhythms that restore you. For spring break, we planned a trip that would help our community do this, and grow with God and one another along the way. After having to cancel our trip to Holden Village in March of 2020, our community wanted to go make the journey to this amazing village in the Cascades that has a lot to teach us about community, rest, and life balance. Students looked forward to “unplugging” in God’s beautiful creation, with no cell service or wifi, and in loving community, where they could just “be”.

“Being away from society gave me a chance to reflect on what it means to be a human in this world and life. During one of my breaks from working in the kitchen, I just went outside and sat on a log for 20 minutes, taking in what the Earth was offering. It was the most peaceful I’ve ever felt in my entire life.” -Dylan B.

In addition to this opportunity to just “be,” our students tried many new things while they were at Holden. Some spent time, hiking, snowshoeing, skiing, and sledding. Others took the chance to read for fun, learn new artsy skills, like weaving or gathered with Holden folks to play board games. Some rested with a warm cup of tea and a slice of Holden-famous bread or took naps during free time with no guilt. This rest looked different for everybody but regardless, was transformational.

“The time I spent in Holden Village was one of the most relaxed I’ve ever felt. The community there had such a focus on personal well-being which, alongside the tight knit community atmosphere, made it very peaceful. Nothing felt rushed or forced and everything, even our work in the cleaning crew, was a lot of fun!” -Mikaela N.

While being at Holden and being a part of the village life unfolding there, many of our students came back with a new appreciation and desire for balance – and are discovering ways to incorporate moments of rest, movement, discovery, community, joy – into their daily rhythms here on campus.
